



## The Esther Honey Foundation 2013 Statement of Services

In 2013, 83 International EHF volunteers, including 40 veterinarians, travelled to the Cook Islands to treat 2,894 animals. They spayed and neutered 791 cats and dogs, served 15,138 meals to the animals in our care and rehomed 246 homeless animals. Our veterinary teams conducted three EHF VET TREK<sup>®</sup> clinics to outer islands.

The foundation's community education program included school presentations, clinic tours, newspaper articles and television interviews addressing animal health and welfare issues. We also trained local students in animal care through clinic volunteer programs.

The combined value of the veterinary goods and services provided by the Esther Honey Foundation and our supporters to the Cook Islands animals and communities in 2013 totaled \$911,947.84.

The Esther Honey Foundation has contributed \$6.7 million USD in veterinary, education, shelter services and drugs and supplies to the Cook Islands since 1995 when the Esther Honey Foundation established the Cook Islands' only veterinary clinic.



Since that time, more than 343 veterinarians, hundreds of veterinary professionals and animal advocates have travelled to the Cook Islands to treat 38,013 patients, sterilize more than 14,132 dogs and cats and provide veterinary, education and training services to outer islands during 113 EHF VET TREK<sup>®</sup> clinics. EHF's scientifically-proven spay/neuter program has significantly reduced the dog population on Rarotonga.
